

- 2.4 Officers continue to be deployed across the Borough, 7 days per week to detect offences with the aim of reducing the amount of litter across the Borough.
- 2.5 Members are reminded that should they wish to accompany any of the officers on patrol to observe first-hand how they engage with the public, that may be arranged.
- 2.6 All those that have been given a FPN have the right of representation directly to the company to challenge the issue. - 2.7 For those who do not have internet access an address for written representations can be provided.
- 2.8 Council officers will continue to work with WISE officers targeting litter hotspots and promoting anti-litter initiatives such as the Butt Ballot boxes, use of litter bins, and the Green Dog Walker scheme.
