

# Census 2021 is coming to Causeway Coast and **Glens**

The census happens only once every 10 years and gives us a picture of all the people and households in Northern Ireland. The last census was in 2011 and counted 1,810,900 people living here. There were 53,722 households in Causeway Coast & Glens made up of 140.877 people.

It will be the first census run predominantly online although paper questionnaires will still be available on request.

Census data is used to help make decisions about how vital services such as education, transport and health are planned and funded including how millions of pounds are invested across the Causeway Coast & Glens Borough Council area.

Census day will be on March 21st. but households across Northern Ireland will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from the beginning of March 2021.

# Are you ClimateSmart?



ClimateSmart is the latest element of our overarching LiveSmart campaign.

It aims to reduce our carbon footprint by increasing knowledge about sustainability and empowering change through simple, practical

Everyone has a role to play in protecting our Borough for future generations.

One local enterprise which embodies the very essence of ClimateSmart is Flesk Water Camping, nestled beside the Flesk Water between Cloughmills and Armoy.

Andrew MacUait, the ecopreneur behind the venture, is committed to providing a high quality camping/glamping experience while minimising its impacts on the environment.

### Some of these actions include:

Planting in excess of 250 trees and allowing wild areas to flourish and

Installing solar panels which generate most of the site's electricity. using biogas to heat water, treating waste water so that it can be discharged safely into the river, which is an important habitat for a variety of wildlife, including trout, kingfishers, herons and even the occasional otter.

Repurposing lorry containers to make toilet and shower blocks and using reclaimed timber to make cabins and other site structures. Disposable barbeques aren't allowed and bamboo cutlery is provided at a very low cost to ensure disposable plastic cutlery isn't used.

Waste is separated and recycled and visitors are encouraged to leave no trace.

Engaging with the local community ensuring goods and services are sourced as locally as possible.

We want to thank all our residents who have carried on recycling in spite of the challenges we've faced this year.


Your actions have shown that small but powerful actions can still enact positive change on the world around us.



Causeway Coast and Glens Local Action Group (LAG) manages the delivery of the current Northern Ireland Rural Development Programme for this Borough. The main aims of the LAG are to assist in stimulating the local economy and support its rural communities through job creation and reducing rural isolation. The LAG has now made offers of funding of over £5.97 million to businesses and community groups within the Borough. Further funding worth over £1.94 million has also been allocated to the Council to enhance villages and for tourism projects. This means the LAG has agreed £7.9 million of funding to various projects in the Borough.
