The purpose of this report is to provide Members with information regarding the Minor Capital Grants Programme 2018-19.

Background

In November 2017 Council agreed that both a Large Capital Grant Programme and a Minor Capital Grant programme would operate in 2018-19 with a combined budget of £750k. No Budget breakdown between the two programmes was agreed.

Minor Capital Grants Applications

The Minor Capital Grant Fund offers support to the Community and Voluntary Sector within the Causeway Coast and Glens Borough Council area to develop and improve the Infrastructure of community premises. Financial assistance of between £5,000 and £30,000 is available to make small scale improvements to existing community owned premises. The project aims to assist organisations providing facilities for community use to become self-sustaining and offer enhanced community services.

The Minor Capital Grant programme was managed via a one stage process with applicants submitting a short business case using a template supplied by Council. The closing date for completed business cases was 30 March 2018. Awards are available for the Minor Capital Grant programme of between £5,000 and £30,000 (excluding VAT) at a maximum of 75% of eligible project costs.

6 business cases were received in advance of the 30th March 2018 closing date for the Minor Capital Grant Programme.

In September 2018 Council approved to issue Letters of Offer to 4 applicants to a total of £60,020.17 and reject 2 ineligible applicants.

One of the rejected applicants Glor Leim an Mhadaidh appealed their eligibility rejection listed in Table 1 below. The eligibility criteria can be found at **Annex A**.

The appeal panel met in October 18 and decided that Glor Leim an Mhadaidh appeal should be upheld and the application should move to full assessment of the Outline Business Case (OBC).

The original Business Case was assessed against the criteria in **Annex B.** The scores, assessment notes and recommendations are listed in Table 2 below. The Programme quality threshold is 65% to receive an award.

<u>6.</u>	The project must not have started or any related contracts awarded.		
<u>7.</u>	Applications will be considered ineligible if either the applicant Organisation or the site where the project is to be based have received any capital investment from Council in the past five years (date of the last payment from Council will be used).		
<u>8.</u>	Applicants must submit final signed accounts for the previous two financial years. Only those organisations that Council considers to be financially sound will be considered eligible.		
<u>9.</u>	The applicant's accounts must show financial need for the sum applied for.		
<u>10.</u>	Applicants must submit all documentation relevant to demonstrate good governance practices (e.g. Child protection policy, equity statement, financial processes etc.). Only those organisations that Council considers to have appropriate procedures will be eligible.		
<u>11.</u>	All supporting information submitted (see section 7).
