Dog Control Order

Causeway Coast and Glens Borough Council is proposing to introduce a new Dog Control Order and is going to public consultation on the proposal from 27th June for a period of 28 days.

The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act (NI) 2011 came into force in April 2012, enabling Dog Control Orders to replace existing byelaws for dogs.

The Dogs on Leads (Lands at Ballintoy to Whitepark Bay) Order (2023)

The Order would ensure that dogs are kept on a lead all year round from the public right of way through lands from Ballintoy to Whitepark Bay.

Following this period of consultation the process will continue with Council reviewing responses, then reporting to a full Council meeting, followed by a hold of 14 days.
